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## 2015 Brief Overview

- ⇒ In 2015 the New Mexico Office of African American Affairs (OAAA) touched 14 New Mexico counties with resources, services, and reached over 18,000 individuals in collaborative efforts (8000 increase over 2014). The agency has also worked diligently with over 50 collaborating organizations to positively affect the quality of life for African Americans and communities of color.
- ⇒ New Mexico African American population approximately 42,550 (2010 U.S. Census)
- ⇒ Bernalillo county with 19,652 of New Mexico's estimated 42,550 population (2010 U.S. Census)
- ⇒ 9 New Mexico Counties with 1000 or more African American residents: Sandoval, Santa Fe, Valencia, Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Otero, Chaves, Curry, Lea (2010 U.S. Census)

### Brief Highlights of Activity During July 1, 2014 — June 30, 2015

- Goal: Offer programs that provide the overall community resources in education, economics, health and community development that improve the quality of life in New Mexico. The Black Expo celebrates cultural diversity and inclusiveness across all races, ethnicities, nationalities, generations, and socioeconomic levels.
- Outcomes: Products and services of more than 100 small businesses, corporate sponsors, community organizations, African Immigrant community, and colleges and universities, healthcare providers; featured demonstrations, seminars, active learning activities for children, were presented during a two day period.

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT DAY: Under partnership with New Mexico Workforce Connections, 32 career fair employers were present to offer available positions and recruit minority leadership talent.

Plenary workshop and economic empowerment sessions were facilitated by leading professionals in their field. Over 768 participants attended workshop sessions, special presentations and the corporate luncheon, honoring Ed Corley Sr. as being one the outstanding, legendary, Black business owners in the state of New Mexico. Over 20+ statewide Black owned businesses were represented at the corporate luncheon and plenary sessions.

HEALTH FAIR: African Americans are at the forefront of America's health crisis, the health fair is a collaboration of 21 agencies that offered over 69 free health screenings and exams, demonstrations on healthy living, and information designed to help individuals to live long, healthy lives.

EXHIBITORS AND SMALL BUSINESS: For the first time in NMBE history, the venue attracted over 100 exhibitors from 7 states consisting of health, economic, community organizations, educational, children programing, food, and small business owners. Out of 26 selling exhibitors, 20 offered surveys and or feedback – 18 reported a total combined revenue of \$12,375.30.

### TUSKEGEE AIRMEN YOUTH AVIATION SUMMER CAMP

Collaborators:	Lloyd "Fig" Newton Tuskegee Airmen Chapter, Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico Civil Air Patrol, NM Office of African American Affairs
Goal:	The primary goal of the camp is to inspire young people (ages 12-17) in the local area by introducing them to the world of aviation and aerospace associated career opportunities.
Outcome:	All 25 students successfully completed the youth aviation camp with 85% of students expressing a gained interest in continuing to learn more about the aerospace industry and STEM related careers. Children in underserved community throughout Albuquerque and Magdalena were able to participate in this STEM Camp opportunity which would not have otherwise been afforded them. Students were instructed on flight simulators and provided orientation flights in Cessna aircrafts (take-off and landing, as well as in flight handling of aircraft). In addition, participants learn about military careers in the field of aviation and aircraft maintenance. Lastly, participants took tours of Kirtland AFB and aerospace industry; including FAA, Control Tower and 58th Special Operations Wing.

Outcome:	65+ children from low income households were able to lower the summer learning loss percentile by participating in a forum for children with engaged interaction in rich cultural context of folktales and cultural stories. Participants were encouraged to uti- lize their local library and obtain a library card. Reading sessions were provided twice a week in 2 centers. Books where provided for children to take home at the end of the program, to encourage an increased individual love of reading.

Outcome:	NM Office of African American Affairs sponsored a field trip to view the movie "Selma" and a discussion to follow on the movies relevance in todays cultural atmosphere. Also sponsored two speakers; Cleveland Robinson from Atlanta, GA, inspirational speaker and "Get Lit" from Los Angeles, CA. Speakers focused on entrepreneurship and how to express yourself through spoken word.

Goal:	In February 2014, President Obama launched the My Brother's Keeper (MBK) initiative to address persistent opportunity gaps faced by boys and young men of color and en- sure that all young people can reach their full potential. The initiative seeks to organize and capitalize on the commitment of community leaders in order to reach that goal. In the fall of 2014, the Administration issued a challenge to cities, towns, counties, and tribal nations across the country to become "MBK Communities."
	The City of Albuquerque formed a coalition of organizations, the MBK Challenge Part- ners, to discuss strategies on implementing a coherent "cradle—to—college—and— career strategy" for improving the outcomes of all young people, including boys and young men of color.
Outcome:	More than 200 youth from more than ten schools and programs attended the Summit, 100 community members and leaders joined the young people in the conversations. The day was broken up into two major sections. Feedback and data from each of these sessions was collected by the New Mexico Forum for Youth in Community and then analyzed.

Goal:	To provide a process, education, and information that will allow for the African American and other cultures to think differently about life style choices which lead to unhealthy habits, thoughts, attitudes, and actions.	
Outcome:	Out of the 43 participants who started the challenge, 24 participants completed the program. Many changed the way they see food, how they approach exercise, and how often they eat junk food. Participants reported weight loss and decrease of medications and improved health. 100% of participants who completed the challenge said they would join again, felt the work shop instructors and work our facilitators were clear, useful and relevant, and their knowledge of how to lead a healthier lifestyle increased during the challenge.


