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## 2016 Brief Overview

- $\Rightarrow$  In 2016 the New Mexico Office of African American Affairs (OAAA) reached out to 14 New Mexico counties with resources, services, and reached over 10,000 individuals in collaborative efforts. The agency also worked diligently with over 60 collaborating organizations to positively affect the quality of life for African Americans and communities of color.
- $\Rightarrow$  There are 10 New Mexico Counties with 1000 or more African American residents: Sandoval, Santa Fe, Valencia, Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Otero, Chaves, Curry, Lea, and San Juan (2012 U.S. Census Survey).
- $\Rightarrow$  OAAA reached 14 counties in 2016; San Juan, Santa Fe, Dona Ana, Chaves, Curry, Lea, Valencia, Sandoval, Bernalillo, Socorro, Roosevelt, Taos, Otero, Eddy.

#### SUMMER LITERACY ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

July 2015 & June 201	6
County:	Bernalillo
Attendance:	90+ Youth
Collaborators:	Cesar Chavez Community Center, Thomas Bell Community Center, Brenda Hollingsworth-Marley (NM Storyteller), NM Office of African American Affairs
Goal:	Join with Governor Susana Martinez's Summer Reading Challenge to promote the development of language, literacy, listening and reading comprehension, and oral and written expression through a forum for children and parents by interacting in the rich cultural context of folktales and other cultural stories.
Outcome:	90+ youth from low income households were able to lower the summer learning loss percentile by participating in a forum for children engaging in a rich cultural context of folktales and cultural stories. Participants were encouraged to utilize their local library and obtain a library card. Reading sessions were provided twice a week in 2 centers. Books where provided for children to take home at the end of the program to encourage an increased individual love for reading.

Also discussed current trends in prevention and intervention, and initiatives from other states that may work in New Mexico's African American Commu- nity.
Outcome:	23 health vendors collaborated to offer a Health and Wellness Fair recognizing African American HIV Awareness Month.

#### 90 DAY HEALTHY BODY CHALLENGE

March 2016– May 2016

County:	Bernalillo, Sandoval, Santa Fe
Participation:	60
Collaborators:	NM Office of African American Affairs, Presbyterian Healthcare, Blue Cross Blue Shield Van, Lovelace, Cooking with Diabetes, Issyin Ru, eRead, and a host of facilitators
Goal:	To provide a process, education, and information that will allow for African Americans and other cultures to think differently about lifestyle choices which lead to unhealthy habits, thoughts, attitudes, and actions.
Outcome:	Out of the 60 participants who started the challenge, 25 participants completed the program. Many changed the way they see food, how they approach exercise, and how often they eat junk food. Participants reported weight loss and decrease of medications and improved health. 100% of participants who completed the challenge said they would join again. They felt the work shop instructors and facilitators were clear, useful and relevant. Their knowledge of how to lead a healthier lifestyle increased during the challenge.

	In 2006, legislation was passed making New Mexico the 19th state to recognize Juneteenth as a celebration the state should consider. With the passage of House Bill 226, sponsored by Majority Whip Sheryl Williams Stapleton, "Juneteenth Freedom Day" was honored.
Outcome:	Organized a statewide effort and press release issued from Governor Susana Martinez's office to celebrate the 151st year. Funding proposals were submitted and awarded based upon community collaborations and target audiences to assist with the facilitation of celebrations statewide.
	Governor Martinez also issued a statewide proclamation and press release honoring the day as "New Mexico Juneteenth Day."
