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2017 Brief Overview

- ⇒ In 2017 the New Mexico Office of African American Affairs (OAAA) touched 14 New Mexico counties with resources, services, and reached over 10,000 individuals in collaborative efforts. The agency has also worked diligently with over 50 collaborating organizations to positively affect the quality of life for African Americans and communities of color.
- ⇒ There are 11 New Mexico Counties with 1000 or more African American residents: Sandoval, Santa Fe, Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Otero, Chaves, Curry, Lea, San Juan, Otero, McKinley (2015 U.S. Census Survey)
- ⇒ OAAA reached 14 counties in 2017; San Juan, Santa Fe, Dona Ana, Chaves, Curry, Lea, Valencia, Sandoval, Bernalillo, Socorro, Roosevelt, Taos, Otero, Eddy

Brief Highlights of Activity During July 1, 2016 — June 30, 2017

- ⇒ NEW Due to increased program implementation, volume of work and higher demand of agency presence and partnership, the budget analyst position was reclassified to chief financial officer. For the first time in agency history, the CFO is not the executive director.
- ⇒ NEW State of Black New Mexico Data Hub launched with University of New Mexico Center for Education Policy and Research. Readily available data on the NM African American community to show population, economics, education, health and incarceration is hosted on the agency website.
- ⇒ Economics and health policy briefs published with Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to assist agency and elected officials with advocacy and policy efforts.
- ⇒ 5 County Town Halls "The State of Black New Mexico" facilitated to introduce data hub, support community organization advocacy efforts, connect with elected officials.
- ⇒ Zambia trade delegation advocacy meetings facilitated with Albuquerque Sister Cities and government officials.
- ⇒ NEW 28 Days A Hero traveling recognition program honors educators from around the state for their dedication and contributions to education advancement.
- ⇒ NEW The Loan Fund joins with OAAA to insure Black owned businesses have access to capital. Agency provides step by step support for business owners and entrepreneurs in assisting with resources for business start-up/improvement.
- ⇒ NEW Agency staff set an agency record for representation on more than 50 boards, commissions and committees in one fiscal year.

New Mexico, March 6, 2017 - Governor Susana Martinez and the New Mexico Office of African American Affairs (OAAA) release a historic look at the "State of Black New Mexico", through a data hub designed to give a greater advocacy voice to the 3.1% (64,448) Black population. The OAAA contracted the University of New Mexico Center for Education Policy Research to assist in the creation of an interactive online visualization depicting the disproportionate disparities Blacks face in our state.

The on-line data resource provides a single location for more than 50 different health, education, economic and socio-demographic indicators, providing users the means to extensively and quantitatively measure Black communities throughout New Mexico. Data made available is integrated and can be viewed for comparison across various national, state, county, district, and school level perspective. A wide range of data sources utilized are made publicly available by state and federal agencies, including the U.S. Census Bureau, Office of Civil Rights, New Mexico Public Education Department, New Mexico Department of Health, New Mexico Corrections Department and the National Center for Education Statistics.

The "State of Black New Mexico" data hub will assist the governor's administration, advocacy groups, direct service industries, state agencies and elected officials with increased awareness and understanding surrounding multi-dimensional issues facing this underserved population. "Where it has been previously difficult to obtain data, without searching multiple sources, the dash hub will provide statistics needed for targeted intervention strategies for African Americans in New Mexico. The data hub will assist in the ongoing establishment of approaches that will strengthen collaborative networks and policy action, yielding sustainable, continuous initiatives." - Yvette Kaufman-Bell, OAAA Executive Director.

The data hub will also allow the user to make comparisons between the Black population and other racial and ethnic sub-groups to identify potential gaps in services and resources among regional communities. Dr. Kathy Powers and student fellows of the RWJF Center for Health and Policy are working with the OAAA to release policy briefs that will help the agency determine further course of action.

SUMMER LITERACY ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

July - August 2016 Bernalillo, Sandoval County: Attendance: 60+ **Collaborators:** Tomasita Elementary School and Thomas Bell Community Center, Brenda Hollingsworth-Marley (NM Storyteller) Goal: Join with Governor Susana Martinez's Summer Reading Challenge to promote the development of language, literacy, listening and reading comprehension and oral and written expression through a forum for children and parents by interacting in the rich cultural context of folktales and other cultural stories. 60+ youth from low income households were able to lower the summer learning loss Outcome: percentile by interaction with rich folktales and cultural stories. Participants were encouraged to utilize their local library and obtain a library card. Participants engaged in word games, musical instrument exploration, create-a-book activities, and other learning projects. Reading sessions were provided twice a week in 2 centers. Books were provided for children to take home at the end of the program to encourage an increased individual love of reading.

> Many African American community leaders were able to share their stories of how their contributions to communities have made a significant progress locally as well as for the State of New Mexico.

Outcome:	Youth from low income families, ages 5-16, learned how a radio DJ hosts a live broad cast, while learning how circuits work with force, pressure and distance. Participants assembled desktop catapults and circuits utilizing wires, light bulbs, switches and batteries. The program allowed students to interact with audio broadcasting, work a broadcasting unit, become a radio DJ host, learn music history and learn broad casting vocabulary.

	Hair Battle - 7 licensed beauticians and barbers, with over 20+ years experience each, battled for over \$1000 cash and prizes and garnered numerous new appointments due to their appearance at the NMBE.
	HEALTH AWARENESS A collaboration of 30 agencies offered over 125 free health screenings and education information (vision, flu shots, blood pressure, diabetes checks), demonstrations and healthy living information designed to help individuals to live healthy lives. On-site consultations were conducted with the 39 participants who showed abnormal diabetes and blood pressure testing.

90 DAY HEALTHY BODY CHALLENGE

February - March 2017 Counties: Bernalillo, Sandoval, Santa Fe Attendance: 50 in person, 600 Facebook Live **Collaborators:** Presbyterian Healthcare, Blue Cross Blue Shield Mobile Van, Kitchen Creations, Presbyterian Community Partners, Bobbi's Homestyle Cooking, Home Instead, Isshin Ryu, E.R.E.A.D, and a diverse host of facilitators across broad areas of expertise. Goal: To provide educational and experiential workshops on exercise, recreational fitness, cooking & nutrition, disease & weight management, healthcare technology, physical activity and self-advocacy that will increase participants' awareness of healthy living options. Participants reported weight loss, a reduction in prescription medication use, healthier Outcome: water and food consumption as well as improved health measures (e.g., blood sugar, blood pressure, energy levels, etc.). Participants also reported that the workshops helped them make healthier food choices, develop their own personal exercise programs, and engage their healthcare providers. Over 50 90-Day Challenge packets were distributed as an educational tool. Packets contained: 1. Healthier soul food recipe guide 2. Health journal 3. Schedule of weekly workshops and exercise classes with activity for up to 6 days per week 4. Diabetes educational materials 5. Breast and prostate cancer educational materials 6. Tobacco abuse cessation information 7. Health Data on African Americans from the NM OAAA Website Data Hub As additional incentives for attendance and dedication to personal positive health outcomes, prizes were provided by Home Instead and Kitchen Creations includeing kitchen housewares, cutlery, dinnerware, spa gift certificates, and Magic Bullet

smoothie juicing appliances.

Goal:	Present the basics of the business plan, legal structures, loans, marketing, registration, licensing of a business and present readily available resources for small businesses.
Outcome:	Attendees became more aware of the resources available to them while expressing a deeper understanding of the work of the agency. Many said the workshop was informative about the business plan process, where to get help, and how to improve their business. 10 participants were women and 47% African American.

"TALK MONEY TO ME" WORKSHOP

Outcome:	Two sessions were conducted, with students attending from 4 universities and colleg- es in the southwest region. Topics addressed were credit management, how to create then modify a budget, and the many different ways to save that can lead to growing and protecting generational wealth. Students asked questions regarding personal experiences with student loans, stock purchasing, life insurance, home ownership, and much more.

Financial trends among the national Black population, compared to New Mexico, were discussed utilizing the agencies data hub research points.

Outcome:	During a two and a half hour presentation, participants learned: 1. where to find money for businesses through creative funding strategies for small businesses and real estate, 2. the steps business owners need to take in order to acquire business funding, 3. what small business lenders look for in an optimal loan package and addressed the question about whether business owners need a business plan, 4. alternative funding methods and sources, such as micro lenders, equity investors, factoring, and crowdfunding, and 5. advantages and drawbacks of various funding options.

Attendees noted the workshop helped increase their awareness of OAAA activities regardless if they had prior knowledge of our office or not.
